Analytical / Methodical / Systematic

Someone who is Analytical likes to approach problems logically, looking at all the fine details that help them get to a solution. So to build an igloo, an **Analytical** person might draw up a design, gather all the snow necessary, form many blocks, then place each block in the proper position so that the structure is solid. By carefully taking each step in the process, this person would also be considered Methodical - following a repeatable approach for doing the project. This approach is also sometimes considered Systematic, in that there is a well-defined system for building an igloo.

Assembly Line

When a company uses different stations and workers who perform a series of actions on a product, they call it an Assembly Line. A good example is car manufacturing, where workers at one station put on the tires, others drop in an engine, and another paints.

Blunder

Spontaneity
